

HISTORY CORNER

(One Hundred Years Ago – January 1925)

The U.S. Mint started minting the Stone Mountain Memorial Half Dollar in January 1925. By March it had struck a total of 2,314,709 coins. It was struck to raise funding for the Stone Mountain Memorial new Atlanta, Georgia. Notably, the carving of Confederate leaders and soldiers on Stone Mountain was not completed until 1970.

The models for this coin were prepared by Gutzon Borglum, most well-known for his later monumental work – Mount Rushmore. The obverse design features Generals Lee and Jackson, mounted on their respective horses. The reverse features an eagle perched on a mountaintop, with the inscription "MEMORIAL TO THE VALOR OF THE SOLDIER OF THE SOUTH".



While preparation of the coins was in progress, there were mounting tensions between the Stone Mountain Confederate Monumental Association and Gutzon Borglum. Eventually relations became strained to the point that the Association fired Gutzon Borglum in February 1925. Ironically, it appears that it was the coin (it had taken seven months to design), not the memorial itself, that ended Borglum's work on Stone Mountain. Upon being dismissed, Borglum destroyed his models for the monument. The Association eventually hired Augustus H. Lukeman as replacement sculptor and all of Borglum's work on the memorial was blasted away. However, the Association continued to market the half dollars with Borglum's design.

The coins were not officially released until July 3, 1925 and were sold to the public for \$1 each. Although 1,000,000 were eventually returned to the mint for melting, a total of 1,314,709 coins were distributed. It is one of the most common of the classic commemorative silver half dollars and can be found for less than \$100.
