

THE 16th ANNUAL TYLER COIN SHOW

The W. T. Brookshire Conference Center (newly opened) was the venue for the 2024 16th Annual Tyler Coin show held on August 16-17, 2024. Club members began table setup the day before and dealer began arriving shortly thereafter with club members assisting the unloading process.

Tyler's very active coin club opened the doors Friday with nearly 100 tables occupied in the very spacious facility. Attendees were waiting for the 9AM opening and began filing in. The attendance figures of 650 on Friday and over 1000 on Saturday saw someone at every dealer's table all day. With wide aisles and spacious work areas, the facility made finding that special or needed item very easy.

The Tyler Coin Club's active members (over 80 dues paying members) saw most on hand to make this show a success – from working registration, setting up and taking down, assisting dealers unload and load, hourly door prizes.

Scouting Merit Badge – the club has a scouting representative who is a certified coin collecting merit badge counselor. He met with scouts on Saturday and several fulfilled the requirements for the merit badge.

Food Truck – Eljalisciense food truck provided a number of choices of very good tacos, etc for those at the show

Raffle – Raffle tickets were sold at the registration table. A ¼ ounce gold coin graded MS-67 and a Carson City Morgan Dollar graded MS-63 were the main attractions. Many other items were also included. The winner ticket was drawn at the end of the show and Tony, from Gun Barrel City, was the winner (see picture below).

Thank you so much for the autographed copy of your book "In Yankee Doodle's Pocket". It's a great title and I am enjoying the wealth of knowledge the book has to offer. It, the book, has already provided me with ideas for several articles I can write about in my club newsletters as it furnishes me research material for several coins already in my collection, such as: the Spanish pistareen, the German jeton, the Bermuda cent, etc.). Would it be OK if I copied sections of your book (such as the English LSD system description) for future newsletter articles as long as I gave you the credit?

It was a pleasure to visit with you at our Texarkana Coin Club's annual coin show. Are you a member of any Arkansas clubs? I am not. I joined the Hot Springs club years ago but dropped out primarilly because of the long drive. I am a member of the Tyler, Texas, Coin Club as having family there (to visit and stay overnight with) makes it pleasurable. I have often thought about trying to attend a Central Arkansas Coin Club meeting in Little Rock as I'd like to be more associated with the Arkansas Numismatic Association – but know so little about it other than the published names of some of the members.

I am trying to restrict my coin collecting interests to those coins with stories that I can write about in club newsletters (Texarkana and Tyler). I am supposed to have a show-and-tell item in the next Texas Numismatic Association magazine (we'll see). As my fellow club members are almost exclusively U.S. coin collectors, I have made it my mission to introduce them to the joys of foreign coins. I find they are good at resisting this effort. My assembly of several older foreign coins for a colonial America display was part of this effort – and thus my passion for my newly aquired 1721 pistareen.

I hope this letter and package finds you doing well. The lack of coin club meetings has made this my only means of fulfilling your request for a 20th Century Whitman coin folder. I'm sure you'll find one on line, but I find this more personal and "coin club-ish" (my new term).

Anyway, you'll find 2 Whitman books enclosed: one is used and the other new. I included the used book to allow me to pass on a little advice in collecting "type" series. I have been collecting type coins for many years and the 5 type coins provided in the used album I sent all fit "eye appeal" requirements - at least mine (I like them). There is, as you probably know, a minimum grade for each coin to have eye appeal. When collecting a series, you have to pick the coin in the series whose minimum grade, for having eye appeal, is the highest. For instance, in the U.S. twentieth century series, I believe this to be the Liberty nickel. So, you'll find all 5 of the included coins to be in EF condition (the lowest grade I think a Liberty Nickel can be and still have great eye appeal). If you'll examine the coins I've included, they all have eye appeal for more reasons than just the grade (which is just a simple term primarilly used to communicate the level of detail remaining on the coin). For instance, none of the 5 coins have been tampered with - no scratches from rubbing, funny color from dipping, etc. Each of the coins also have patina that makes their designs stand out more than many other coins of the same type and grade - almost as if the grime from commerce is cooperating to make them look better to the naked eye. My advice to you is for you to pick the remaining coins for completing this used book set to match the ones I've included as a gift (of course the more common newer coins can be higher grades).

If you follow this advice, I believe by the time you finish the set you will have learned a lot more about pleasing yourself regarding putting together a nice type set collections. With the new book, you might play with modifying the game plan by maybe filling it with higher grades, rarer dates, or whatever.
